



Executive Summary



NPP Presidential Primaries

- A new opinion poll conducted by Global InfoAnalytics for October 2022 shows the Trade and Industry Minister, Alan Kwadwo Kyerematen (AKK) continues to expand his lead over his closest rival Dr Mahamudu Bawumia (DMB) in the race to lead the NPP as the country's economic crisis deepens. The poll shows AKK is the preferred candidate of general voters to lead the NPP in 2024. AKK now leads DMB, 44% to 31%. Kennedy Ohene Agyapong, MP (KOA) came third with 14% of the votes.
- AKK's double digit lead is the biggest recorded lead since polling began in January 2022. DMD's slide in the poll coincides with the country's worsening economic situation. DMB drops to third place on who voters trust to better manage the economy according the poll, behind John Dramani Mahama (JDM) and AKK.
- ☐ The poll also shows that (KOA), the MP for Assin Central, may force the NPP race into a runoff as he makes inroads into the support base of the establishment candidates.



NPP Presidential Primaries

The poll shows AKK is preferred by general voters to win a runoff with 62% of votes compared with DMB who attracts 38%.
The poll shows 56% of KOA voters will switch to AKK and 9% to DMB while significant 350 say they will not vote in the event of a runoff.
Among NPP voters, the poll shows a tighter race as DMB leads AKK by 42% to 40%. DMB had led by 44% to 42 % in the July 2022 polls amongst likely NPP voters.
However, though with a much smaller sample size, amongst respondents who identified themselves as NPP delegates, DMB leads AKK by 53% to 27%.
The data suggests that the views of the general voters and that of NPP affiliates has narrowed compared to July 2022.



NDC Presidential Primaries

☐ In the NDC race, John Dramani Mahama (JDM) is on course to lead the party, at least according to general voters, as the polls continue to show him in a stable lead. He leads Dr Kwabena Duffour (DKD) 71% to 19%. Hon. Kojo Bonsu, attracts 3% of the votes with someone else,7%. DKD's improvement in the polls suggests that people who had earlier said they intended to vote for someone else in the July polls, opting for him instead.

General Elections

- ☐ In the general elections, the poll shows JDM continues to lead his potential rivals from the NPP, DMB and AKK by a significant margin if the elections were held today.
- ☐ The poll shows further that among voters who are likely to vote in the 2024 elections, JDM leads DMB 62% to 33%, representing a 29% lead. 6% of voters prefer to vote for someone else (SO). In the race between JDM and AKK, JDM leads AKK 60% to 36%, representing a 24% lead. 5% prefer to vote for SO.



- ☐ The poll also shows JDM regaining the Northern region after lagging behind in earlier polls. JDM continues to lead in the North East region, the home region of the vice president, according to the poll. JDM lead DMB 69% to 28% and leads AKK by 29% to 69%. In the North East, JDM leads DMB by 53% to 45% and AKK by 52% to 48%.
- ☐ The poll shows that the Eastern region may be slipping away from the NPP as JDM expand his lead in the region compared to the July poll. JDM leads DMB 73% by 24% and AKK by 68% to 30%.

Break the Eight

- ☐ On the question of whether the NPP can "Break the Eight", approximately 70% of voters do not believe the NPP can win the 2024 election, whilst 19% believe so and 10% have no opinion.
- ☐ In what could be more troubling for the ruling party, approximately 46% of NPP voters do not believe the party can win the 2024 elections compared to 43% who believe they can win. 12% did not have opinion.



Direction of the Country

Approximately 76% of voters believe Ghana is headed in the wrong direction compared to 20% with further 7% saying they have no opinion. This poll numbers have largely remained flat when compared with the July 2022 poll.

President's Job Approval

On the president's job approval rating, 69% of voter disapprove his performance compared to 26% who approve of his performance, with 5% saying they have no opinion, resulting in net disapproval of -43%, compared to -50% in July 2022.

Performance of the Government

Over half of voters believe the government has performed poorly, 53%. Approximately 20% rated the government performance as good and 4% as excellent, 17% rated the government's performance as average. 3% did not have opinion.



Corruption and Corrupt Public Institutions

On Corruption, 62% of voters say it getting worse compared to 12% who say it is improving. When voters were asked to cite the most corrupt public institutions in Ghana, the Ghana Police Service led the pack with 12.2%, followed by Judiciary and the Presidency with 9.2% and 9.0% respectively. The least corrupt institutions cited were the churches and mosques with 1.8% and 0.8% respectively.

Standard and Cost of living crisis

67% of voters (over two-third) of voters said their standard of living compared to a year ago has worsened, only 9% said it has improved and 21% said it has remained the same. When voters were asked which cost of living crisis is affecting them most, cost of public transport toped with 20%, followed by cost of petrol and diesel with 18% and third is cost of groceries and food 17%.

Review of Free Education Policy

On the government's flagship programme of free education, 65% of voters agree that the policy should be reviewed in order to safe it from collapse, 26% of voters disagree and 9% did not have opinion. Top three reforms voters are likely to support are introduction of cut-off grade, 26%, parents bearing the cost of feeding, 22% and gradual reversing board to day ratio from the current 70:30 to 30:70, 16%.




Methodology & Approach

Methodology and Approach:

☐Sample size: 5,661

□Confidence level: 99%

☐MoE: 1.712%





- ☐A random simulation for all the 275 constituencies was then run to select constituencies where the allocated sample will be administered from each region.
- The selected constituencies were then allocated a sample based on total number of voters in the constituencies relative to those selected from the region.
- □A minimum of three electoral areas were covered in each constituency except where the sample is below 20, in which case, the sample was administered in one electoral area.

Methodology and Approach continued...



- □Voters' party affiliation was the last question asked
- □Party affiliation is defined as the party the voter usually votes for, or in the case of first-time voters, the party they intend to vote for. Floating voters are voters who vote different political parties over several election cycles or voters who do not align with any of the registered political parties in the country.
- ☐ Field interviews were conducted between 1st October to 14th October 2022
- Data collection was carried out using mobile devices with real-time data transmission to the polling system using survey App. An offline version of the App was also deployed where data connectivity was a challenge.
- ☐ The polling report is unweighted.

Distribution of First-Time Voters by Region








Direction of the country-First-Time Voters








Who would you vote for in 2024?




Who would you vote for in 2024?-Party Affiliations






Who would you vote for in 2024?-Gender






Who would you vote for in 2024?-Ethnic Group






Who would you vote for in 2024?-Party Affiliations







Who would you vote for in 2024?-Gender




Who would you vote for in 2024?-Ethnic Group








Break the Eight (8) — Party Affiliations









2020 Presidential Elections Exit Poll

Which of the following candidates did you vote for in 2020 Elections?







How Voters who voted in 2020 intend to vote in 2024
